## Exercise 1: Put the given words into the correct part of the table.

#### Exercise 2: Are the highlighted words True or False? Read and choose.

1. True

**Explanation**: Impressed means admiring somebody/something because you think they are particularly good, interesting, etc.

2. True

**Explanation**: Relieved means feeling happy because something unpleasant has stopped or has not happened.

3. False

**Explanation**: Frightened means feeling fear. Because "she can read and understand that Chinese novel", she is very good at Chinese. That's the reason why the speaker may feel surprised, or amazed, not "frightened".

4. False

**Explanation**: Surprised means feeling or showing surprise because something has happened that you did not expect. Therefore, the correct sentence should be "People said that he was a liar. I was not surprised that he didn't keep his promise."

#### **Exercise 4: Choose the correct answers.**

1. The team was *disappointed* when they lost the match by two points.

**Explanation:** Disappointed means unhappy because someone or something was not as good as you hoped or expected, or because something did not happen.

2. I was very **bored of** my cousin Billy. He spent hours talking about his match.

**Explanation:** "Bored of" means feeling tired because you have lost interest in somebody/something.

3. Ethan felt so *embarrassed* when he forgot the sentences he had to say in the play.

**Explanation:** Embarrassed means feeling ashamed or shy.

4. I don't enjoy basketball anymore. I'm getting *depressed* about always being in the bottom team.

**Explanation:** Depressed means unhappy and without hope.

5. Elsa borrowed her sister's best dress without asking and spoiled it last night. Her sister was *angry* about what Elsa did.

**Explanation:** Angry means having a strong feeling against someone who has behaved badly, making you want to shout at them or hurt them.
